MATCHPOINT SCORING - from Herold Rienstra

Our regular Club bridge sessions are scored using Matchpoints (MPs). The following explains how the scoring is done and how your placing and percentage is calculated. The data below is an example of the scoring for one board in a Mitchell movement.

Board 5 — Dealer North — NS Vulnerable

In this example there are 7 full tables and so each NS and EW pair play 7 other pairs. Each pair, however, is scored against the 6 other pairs sitting in the same direction.

Take pair 4 sitting EW, on this board they played against NS pair 3 and bid 2C and made 11 tricks. The EW score is 150. Calculating the MP's for this; They beat 4 other EW's and drew with 1 other EW, for each win 2 MP's are awarded and for each draw 1 MP is awarded. Therefore 9 MP's (4x2+1x1) are awarded to EW4 for this board.

(Note that there are 12 MP's available for each board (6x2) so the NS 3 pair got the other 3 MP's).

As a second example let's now look at NS pair 7. On this board they played against EW pair 5 and defeated their contract of 5C by 1 trick. Hence they scored 50. In terms of MP's they beat 5 other pairs and tied with one pair. Hence they got 11 MP's (5x2+1x1).

In total for the day, lets say 28 boards were played, Matchpoints from 0 to 12 are allotted for each board, therefore there are a possible 28x12 = 336 MP's.

You add up MP's for the 28 boards your partnership played. If your total MP's is say 204, your percentage for the day is (204/336)x100 =61%. The highest percentages in each direction are obviously the winners.

With a Howell movement matchpoint scoring is also used. In teams events a different method of scoring is used.
